



Adam has left a huge hole in many hearts within our school community and he will walk with many of us for the rest of our lives and will never be forgotten.




Nikolao




There were three nominees for the 2013 Cultural Group of the Year which went to the Senior Concert Band. The other nominees were Blues Machine and Plainmotion Band.

The NPBHS/ NPGHS 2013 season got off to a solid start at the end of 2012 with a 3 day training camp over in Tongariro National Park.

Here the teams did a rogaine followed by some initiative challenges and a mini adventure race. At the end of the summer holidays we then tackled the Kaweka mountain run, a grueling 33km run incorporating nearly 3000 metres of climbing and 3000 metres of descent. Two weeks later we headed to Coromandel for the ARC 12 hour race. After 17 hours our 2 teams crossed the finish line well into the dark zone. Local trips and training followed until one of our key events, the NISS 12 hour Adventure Racing Championships, known as the GO 4

This event started on the banks of the Tukituki River one morning in April. At 5 am over 30 schools from both the North and South islands embarked on a 12 hour adventure. A mad 1 km dash saw the teams carrying their bikes across the river before a ride to Hastings and a rogaine in the dark around Splash Planet. Bikes were again used to reach the coast at the mouth of the Clyde River where challenges were undertaken using kayaks and Waka. Then on to Haumoana and a transition to foot for a trek along the beach to Cape Kidnappers and then back inland. Tough navigation and steep terrain meant many teams struggled in this section and ran out of time.

From the trek the teams took to their bikes and crossed the Tukituki River again and headed to Havelock North. Here they

faced limited time to do as many of the available challenges as possible, for example archery, as well as 4 arienteering maps. Only 3 teams completed all the challenges, the NPBHS two senior boys' teams and Opunake senior boys.

Prizegiving the next day saw Taranaki teams dominate with the NPBHS boys' senior team of Matt Furze, Liam Hawley, Thomas Lawley, and Hamish Sturmer win with 7150 paints. In third place 50 paints behind Opunake and with 7000 points was our senior boys' team of William Adlam, Tom Spencer, Steven Mead, and Iuean Mcleod. Our senior girls' team of Lyneche Simkin, Erika Barr, Ruby Tinson, and Ellie Tvrdeich were first equal with 4580 paints, despite coming in late. The trek had hindered all the senior girls' teams.

The junior results were also pleasing. Our junior boys' team of Sam Evans, Matthew Roodbeen, Nick Trowbridge, and Callum Sutherland took out the title with 4155 points, with our team of Sam Furze, Logan Ellis, Abe Larsen, Max McCallum, gaining third place with a score of 3335 points.

Many thanks must go to our parents and supparters who faithfully manned the transitions and looked after their teams.

Hillary Challenge 2013

May 13 to 17, 2013 saw the 13th annual Genesis Energy Hillary Challenge take place at the Sir Edmund Hillary Outdoor Pursuits Centre of NZ in Tongariro National Park.

Our combined NPGHS/NPBHS team of Lyneche Simkin, Ellie Tvrdeich, Ruby Tinson, Erika Barr, Tom Spencer, Matt Furze, Hamish Sturmer, and William Adlam arrived with the accumulated expectations of 7 past wins and 4 second places on their shoulders, but also knowing they had trained hard, and there was a huge community of supporters watching their progress. The weather forecast was great, the Sunday night presentation inspirational, so it was going to be an awesome week.

Days 1 and 2 involved the 12 teams (selected from over 60 who attended the qualifying round) rotating around 12 one hour initiative challenges, 6 on each day. These were multidimensional problem solving exercises that tested both mind and body, but in particular, teamwork. Examples included a search and rescue exercise, a high ropes activity involving downpipes and trying to transfer tennis balls, communication activities, frisbee golf with a problem to solve at each hole, firelighting with bivvy building and pizza cooking to name a few. Teams were scored on the outcome but also the process, how well they worked as a team.

On the Monday night each team had to perform a live 5 minute presentation on encouraging young people into the outdoors. We were pretty excited when we won this challenge, only the second time we had done this in 12 years competing.

Our teams performance in the challenges was solid, with a couple that we really 'nailed' so it was encouraging to emerge at the end of the first 2 days with a 60 point lead over Opunake with Cambridge in third place. Not much of a lead but at least we were not chasing the field.

Hillary Challenge is won or lost on the two day rogaine, where teams have to navigate long distances with heavy packs to try and reach as many checkpoints as possible, with a night camping in the mountains as part of the trip. The rogaine in 2013 spanned the terrain from the Desert Rd to the Chateau, much of it above the bush line. Our navigators did a superb job and the team had a successful expedition, covering over 55km and 2800 vertical meters over the two days. We did not know it then but our lead had been extended. The team came across the finish line shattered, having given everything over the two days.

The last day of Hillary Challenge is a 5 hour adventure race. Teams left in pairs at half hour intervals, and we were paired with Opunake, which was a good thing as strong competition makes both teams go faster. The course consisted of a 4 km paddle on a local lake, followed by a 7 km run. Then there was the transition to the bike for a 36km ride off road, which included

a trip through some caves. Then a final 7 km run, which was really a bush bash as the track had not existed the day before and had only just been cut. We were the second fastest team, 10 minutes behind Waimea College, completing the course in 4 hours 42 minutes, 15 minutes ahead on Opunake. Over 35 hours of intense competition over 5 days incorporating 2 nights camping out was now over.

At the prize giving we managed to take out first place, over 200 points ahead of Cambridge High School, with Opunake not far behind in third.

NZSS ATHLETICS 2012

Eight boys travelled to Dunedin in early December 2012 for the NZSS Athletics Championships. Three boys returned with medals and a host of school records were broken in what was a very successful weekend for the school.

athletes at or near the very top in their chosen discipline.

Matt Baxter ended his extraordinary school running career in the fairy-tale it deserved. Matt won the senior 3000m in a NZSS record of 8.15.50. He won by 30 seconds, took 3 seconds off the 21 year old NZSS record and 14 off his school record. Matt was named as one of two Male "Athletes of the Meet".

Javon McCallum had a busy and hugely successful weekend. Javon lowered his own school 400m record 3 times running 53.43 in the junior boys 400m heats, 52.82 in the semis and 51.34 in the final to place 2nd. This is faster than the intermediate record and within a second of the school senior record. He also lowered his 100m school record time in the heats running 11.53. His 11.70 quarter final wasn't quick enough to advance.

Also in record breaking form was Connor Hobbs. He finished 5th in the senior triple jump with 13.40m erasing the oldest record in the book - PJohns (1962) 13.37m. His 6.35m long jump was good enough for 8th place.

Jono Brownjohn won his 4 events in the AWD AMP class. His 100m time of 14.05 was well under his own NZ record, but just over the wind allowance so doesn't count as a record. The wind was allowable for his 29.17 200m time to take 5 seconds of his old NZ record. A 4.78m long jump and a 1.60m high Jump were also NZ records for Jono.

Tom Spencer had a glamour field to contend with in the 2000m steeplechase. He finished 7th in 6.23.87 which is a school record (Josh Taylor 6.26, 2010) and would have medalled with this time in some years.

Angus White ran a creditable 6th in the Year 9 3000m road

Rhys Bishop won his senior 800m heat, but although his semifinal time (1.57.48) would have won the other semi his 6th placing meant he did not progress.

Justin Bishop was second in his junior 800m heat and was also 6th in his semi-final in 2.13.

The school entered a 4 x 400m relay team for the first time. Rhys, Justin, Matt and Javon finished 8th in 3.35.66 to add one final record for the weekend.

SCHOOL ATHLETICS SPORTS

School athletics sports were held at the TET stadium in Inglewood on Wednesday, March 6th. There were some quality performances and two school records fell. Standout senior athletes included Rhys Bishop (1500m, 3000m), Reuben O'Neill (shot put, discus) and Jordan Young (long jump, 200m), but for the second time Connor Hobbs (100m, 400m, triple jump) was senior champion.

In the intermediate events Emmerson Potts-Broughton threw a stunning 50.52m to break the discus record and Ross Stembridge (1500m, 3000m) and Justin Bishop (800m) managed to share the Intermediate title. Javon McCallum (100m, 200m, 400m) was all class with a sprinting trifecta including a school record 51.28 in the 400m.

Alex Sturmer was the standout junior (400m, 800m, 1500m, 3000m). Also impressive were Jahmarl Weir (discus, shot put) and Kodee Maxwell (high jump, triple jump).

The House competition was a comfortable victory for Hatherly from Syme, Barak and Donnelly.



An extremely successful trip to Malaysia saw the boys win all of their games and score lots of goals. They also got to experience many cultural aspects of south east Asia. This included an eye-opening day at a Malaysian orphanage which saw all of the boys step up and help the orphanage staff care for the children.





Taranaki SS Swimming Champs

This year the TSS swimming champs were held on Wed 10th April at Stratford and NPBHS were successful in winning 12 of the available 18 titles at either Junior, Intermediate or Senior categories.

Julian Weir, yet again as he has done over his time at NPBHS, dominated in his individual races, winning each of his Senior boys events, two of these in record times (new records were set by Julian in the 100m freestyle: 52.95 sec and 50m backstroke: 27.42 sec) Julian also won the Senior boys 50m butterfly.

Daniel Barron was equally dominant in the Junior Boys' events, winning the 50m breastroke and 50m butterfly as well as coming 2nd in the 100m freestyle.

New records were also set in the Senior Boys' freestyle relay (48.67 sec) a superb time, when you consider the average time for each swimmer in his 25m leg to be just over 12 sec per length and the Senior Boys medley relay (48.67 sec).

Our Junior boys were also successful in winning both their relays (freestyle and medley). Our Intermediates just missed out on winning both relays, winning their freestyle relay but being just beaten into 2nd place in their medley relay. Mitchell and Talor Owen were also successful in gaining individual titles.

The boys performed exceptionally well and yet again it was pleasing to see the many parents who transported the boys to Stratford and watched their sons compete. A big thank you for your support of NPBHS swimming. Great effort boys. Our usual feed of fish'n'chips completed another very successful TSS swimming champs.

NZSS Swimming Champs

Two of our swimmers this year attended the NZ Sec Schools swimming champs, held in Hamilton during 6-8 Sept. These were Julian Weir and Isaac Hardie Boys.

Isaac swam well in his 15 years age group, placing 18th in the 200m freestyle, 14th in the 50m butterfly, 16th in the 50m backstroke, 25th in 200m medley, 25th in 50m freestyle, 19th in 100m backstroke, and 22nd in 100m freestyle. This represents a ranking of where Isaac is at for Sec school level competition right now and I am sure he will be working hard next year to make further progress, considering this was his first year at this

He gained personal bests in most of these events which is great

Julian had an outstanding set of results. Competing in the 16 - 18 years events Julian won Gold in the 100m freestyle, and 100m backstroke, and silver medals in the 200m freestyle, 50m freestyle and 50m backstroke.

This is an outstanding achievement for it clearly ranks Julian in the top rankings of NZ Sec school swimmers this year.

Julian also competed successfully in the Skins races as well. These 50m races start with the fastest 8 swimmers, and after each race, 2 swimmers are eliminated until only the final 2 swimmers remain.

Each race must begin after a set time has elapsed and therefore is a real test of endurance and sustaining sufficient speed to ensure you are not eliminated.

Julian showed his endurance and speed by winning both the 50m freestyle and 50m backstroke skin events.

Sportsman of Year 2013

Julian Weir is an outstanding young man and an exceptionally gifted swimmer, and is in my opinion, unquestionably NPBHS's best ever swimmer. His record speaks for itself and Julian fully deserves this recognition. His training regime of nine 2-hour sessions in the pool as well as 2 gym sessions per week for 50 weeks each year, has seen Julian this year gain a top 10 ranking amongst NZ's elite swimmers, NZ representation, and the No.1 ranked secondary school age swimmer in NZ.

Julian swam for NZ this year at the International 30country Australian Youth festival (effectively a Junior World Championship) and gained an impressive 5th place in the 100m backstroke. This is an outstanding achievement against the world's best U18 year age swimmers.

Julian has also just recently been selected for the NZ team to compete in the Queensland State championships in December and he will be the youngest team member.

Julian is also a national age group champion and Open finalist in both short course (25m) and long course (50m) pools. To be selected for NZ requires a top 10 finish at the open championships and Julian this year place 4th in 50m backstroke, 5th in 100m backstroke, 7th in 200m backstroke and 5th in 100m freestyle. This is an outstanding achievement, competing against the very best Olympian-class NZ swimmers.

Julian is also the NZ secondary schools champion in 100m freestyle (record timed) 100m backstroke, and the Skins 50mfreestyle and 50m backstroke. He was 2nd in the 200m freestyle, 50m freestyle and 50m backstroke. These results are clear evidence that Julian is NZ's No. 1 ranked secondary school swimmer this year.

Julian is also a Taranaki representative and a substantial record holder, being the current holder of 36 records.

Julian is also the TSS Senior champion (creating 2 new records) as well as opur Schools Senior champion, creating 5 new records in Senior and Open events this year. He currently holds 12 of the 14 available school swimming records, and has been our school swimming champion at each level throughout his 5 years at school. A remarkable achievement.

Sebastian Eastment, Yr 13 was the winner of the school speech competition. In this year's ANZ RSA Cyril Bassett VC Speech Competition he came first in the Taranaki, Wanganui, Manawatu, Wellington and the West Coast and was one of seven national finalists. This is his entry.

Our People, My People
He aha te mea nui o te ao?
He tangata! He tangata! He tangata!
What is the most important thing in the world?
It is people! It is people! It is people!
On ANZAC day we remember "the people" involved in war

and conflicts over the years. How do we remember? How do we show our respect for "our people"?

Many of us gather at war memorials throughout the country, we crane our necks to see the noble rows of ex-servicemen; we are humbled by their dignity, awed by their comradeship. Like a twitch upon a thread, the training and the disciplines

of service are back in the angle of their jaw and their salute. Their eyes see images in the flutter of the flag that we cannot see-pictures of battles years ago in Europe, Africa and the Pacific, then Korea, Vietnam and more recently, Bosnia, Timor and Afghanistan.

Many who attend these services wear the medals of their deceased loved ones, sometimes on the wrong side of their jacket but always, always with honour and pride.

Today, I am not wearing my father's medal. Forty years ago, my Dad said goodbye to his basketball team, was farewelled by his workmates, purchased a burger at the Frankton Takeaway and waited, shivering and surly, for the train to take him to Waiouru for Compulsory Military Training. Today he doesn't hear too well - standing beside fifty-five cannons has done some damage to the old lugs. As we remember our people, how many of us actually know their stories? How many are from families like mine where war stories weren't shared? My Grandfathers and uncles were stoic and silent - hardly ever speaking a word of their

We must respect their decision to remain silent. Remembrance begins with respect. But we must discover their stories and we must continue to remember them in the generations to come.

experiences, up until it was time for them to join their fallen

How do we do this?

Well it starts at your local High School. Studying history provides us with the tools to go out and find these stories. My History teacher has given me the gift of discovery and I've enjoyed using it to explore the wartime experiences of 'my people'.

My Grandfather was wearing the uniform I'm in now at the outbreak of the Second World War. By 1940 he was Head Boy, and his and his fellow students' future was very different from what appears to be ahead of us. Today, our Head Boy has many doors open to him, professional sport, university, overseas travel. In 1940, it was Army, Navy or Air force - destination: frontline.

It was when I was studying the Battle for Crete and being taught how to use the Kippenberger Research Centre at the Waiouru Museum that I discovered the story of my Great Uncle Reg.

All that was known about Reg was that he had volunteered at the outbreak of war. He was taken prisoner in Europe, hospitalised in England after the war and wasn't well enough to return to New Zealand for two more years. The man who came home was stooped, and thin, with ghastly weeping scars encircling his legs. He settled as a farmer and later drove big rigs. He didn't like traffic cops, and couldn't stand being near peaches. He died in 1980, rarely, ever, speaking a word about what he had been through. So what had he been through?

In the library at Waiouru Military Museum is a well-thumbed, leather bound volume - listing the names of Prisoners of War. And there he is: PRIVATE REGINALD AYELET - PRISONER - CAPTURED IN CRETE, TRANSPORTED TO LAMBSDORF STALAG 344.

By using the other resources in this library I discovered that Reg was a diesel engineer. He was nicknamed Aussie and that during the evacuation of Crete he nursed the final Bren carrier in operation over the mountains, picking up those who could go no further.

Conditions on Crete for those left behind were miserable. Food and water were scarce, they foraged for fruit; often peaches, and there was dysentery and flies from rotting bodies.

His journey to Germany would have been awful, transported by rail in cattle trucks without any basic comforts.

Lamsdorf was one of the largest prisons. It was crowded, the concrete floors were damp, the winters were bitter, and soldiers of Reg's rank were forced to work in the coal mines, digging fuel for the German war machine. They were infested with lice and bed bugs. However, Lamsdorf had one redeeming feature-its hospital. Without it, more men would have died of dysentery, typhus and infection. As the war came to an end, the suffering increased; there were gruelling marches, near starvation, more typhus and

even more madness.
And Uncle Reg survived it all,

but not to tell his tale.
So now when I see a memorial, or I hear the last post, I will remember my people. And I will tell their story.

The department now has three small jazz combos (four if you include the sax quartet!). We were joined at the event by groups from several other schools in the Taranaki region as well.

We have had a number of our students this year taking the STAR music course with local recording engineer David Carnavan. This is a practical course aimed at up-skilling students in the area of professional sound setup and recording, essential skills for the modern musician.

A number of our students took part in combined ensembles with Girls' High at the New Zealand Chamber Music Contest and won awards there.

The Blues Machine band won a gold award this year at the Waikato Festival under the direction of Stewart Maunder, and the Stage Band has won silver awards at the Hamilton Festival and the Senior Concert Band and the Sax Quartet both won gold awards at the national concert band festival.

There will be some important new developments in the new year. We will be adjusting the academic programme for all NCEA classes so that students will now be able to pick and choose the standards that they would like to take for NCEA. In this way the students will literally be able to play to their strengths. So for example if a student is intending to go to a tertiary institution to study music after school they might want to take the external score reading exams. On the other hand if a student is a more practically orientated musician and is not intending tertiary music study they might feel that it is not necessary to take those standards. We believe as a department that this will be a positive step forward and will give students more choices in their own musical development.

Star Programmes


Our STAR courses are primarily used to up-skill students in skills which are helpful in the world of work. This year we ran 35 different courses over three terms such as defensive driving, welding, chainsaw safety and forklift driving.

Trades Academy

The Academy is a partnership between Taranaki Secondary Schools, WITT and Industry. This is an opportunity for students to start training in the area of their chosen career path while still at school.

This year our students participated in the Automotive, Electrical, Engineering and Rugby League academies.

While at the Trades Academy students learn in a practical, hands-on environment using industry standard equipment and technology.



Vocational Pathways

Vocational Pathways is a new Government initiative introduced through the Youth Guarantee Scheme.

The aim is to put more emphasis on ensuring that students understand the need for planning a personal vocational pathway or indeed know the significance of, in what direction the subjects they have chosen to take is likely to lead them. A handy tool for both students and parents to assess this "Profile Builder", which is available on the website of youthquarantee.net.nz

Gateway

What is GATEWAY?

Gateway opens a new pathway from school to the world of work. It's a great opportunity to blend school study with workplace learning and experience. Units are assessed in the workplace or by a Gateway Provider, counting towards national qualifications.

Gateway helps build skills for employment, working in real workplaces on real tasks. It gives opportunities to try out potential careers and build links to Industry Training Organisations, Modern Apprenticeships and workplaces.

After an interview with Mr Watts and Mr Moore students are then encouraged to make the initial approach with the employer of their choice for their placement. Most placements have unit standards to do in the workplace and other theory units to do in the classroom. These will all be marked by a registered assessor.

In 2013 we started with 44 boys on the Gateway Programme with 20 boys leaving during the year to either start work, go on to further training or other reasons. Six boys so far have gained apprenticeships this year with another five hopeful.

They were judged by two local judges, Terry Parks and Karyn Grant as well as Jax Hamilton (runner up Masterchef NZ 2011). All three judges were blown away by the amount of thought, flavour and skills the boys showed during the making of their dish. The team walked away with the win and each received a 3 day pass to WOMAD. They were invited to cook their dish on the Taste the world" stage at WOMAD in front of the public.

LETS COOK

During Term 2 we were sent a Let's Cook competition package designed to promote healthy family meals. There were several categories available to enter including chicken dishes, beef dishes and I Love Eggs. We decided to compete in the I Love Eggs category and to begin this process we spent some time looking at pictures in recipe books for ideas for our new, original recipes for the competition. The Year 10 boys were allowed to choose a recipe that featured eggs, that was relatively cheap, was a nutritious meal and one that could be completed within an hour. The boys made out their entry forms with a recipe, a photo and a costing per person. About mid-way through Term 3 once these boys had moved on to another class, we were notified that Bailey Day and Hayden Collier had won the I Love Eggs Competition. Their prize pack consisted of an ipod touch and several recipe books. Their winning recipe will be featured in the Healthy Eating guide either January or February 2014.

REGIONAL COMPETITIONS

These competitions were held at WITT again this year. There are 3 main sections of this competition. Front of House, where students show off their waiting skills, barista skills and table setting. The Static section, where products are made beforehand and dropped off for marking, and Live Cookery where there are a number of different classes for the boys to enter. This year all of our boys entered Live Cookery which consisted of a Pasta Class, a Salmon Class, a Breakfast Class and Team

Challenge. Competition cooking requires a lot of extra work from the boys involved with training and perfecting their dish. It also puts the boys under pressure and tests how well they can cope with that pressure. We camped the night by the Waihohonu river.


Friday saw us pack up and head out to the road, then head home. It was a successful week despite some trying weather conditions.



Thailand Trip

After a very early start (or late night) after the Ball, 23 students and 3 staff members headed off to Auckland Airport to begin a two week educational adventure in South East Asia.

After what felt like days of travelling, the group arrived in Bangkok and walking out of the train station where soon to realise that they were no longer in New Plymouth! The sounds, heat, and smell were a shock to the senses for the group.

Activities in Bangkok involved using public transport to navigate around the city, visits to temples and experiencing traditional Thai massage, shopping at various spots including Ko Sanh Rd and Pat Pong Rd), and the Amazing Race. Malaysia Football Trip

In April of this year a group of seventeen New Plymouth Boys' High School footballers embarked on a tour of Malaysia and Singapore.

This tour has been two years in the making, with boys and parents chopping firewood, selling raffle tickets, running a casino in Ryder Hall, along with a host of other different fund-raising activities. This was the first overseas football trip since the mid-1990's and was the furthest a New Plymouth Boys' High School football team had travelled. The tour had the team flying into the Malaysian capital, Kuala Lumpur and then travelling down the Malaysian peninsula to Singapore. The twelve day tour, saw a very hectic playing schedule of five games in seven days in heat in excess of 30 degrees and close to 100% humidity.

On arrival in Kuala Lumpur, the first day was spent trying to acclimatise to heat twice what we were used to at home. The main goal of management was to prevent students becoming dehydrated by ensuring increased fluid intake. The first game was on day 2 against a local academy side SMK who are coached by an ex-pat Englishman. The game was played at a local school and the first thing we encountered was the lack of facilities. This is something we encountered throughout the tour where changing rooms and showers were a rarity. To counter the heat, games were played at 8.30am and played in 25 minute thirds with rolling substitutions. The game against SMK, saw the boys one nil up but the SMK team came back and equalised. As the game progressed the Boys' High students faded in the heat, but they managed to score two more goals to win 3-1.

At the conclusion of each game the team would perform the school haka to the opposition team and their supporters. In the first game Kai Nakumura, an international student living in the school hostel for only 10 months, led the haka with passion and determination in front of his family who had flown in from Osaka to watch him play.

The second game was played against the KL Football Club's international academy. This game was expected to be one of the tougher games of the itinerary. We had concerns as the game had been brought forward to the hottest part of the day at 3.00pm instead of the scheduled 5.00pm. We soon

discovered why, as thunderstorms and torrential downpours occurred at around that time. The KL Football Academy was a very well drilled and skilled side and in spite of the extreme heat Boys' High won the game 3-nil. This particular game was delayed at half time because of thunderstorms and in the end it was called off ten minutes early as a lightning storm struck overhead - within minutes the field was a lake. As the club had limited showering facilities the boys took the opportunity the tropical downpour provided to shower out in the open.

The next game was against an Australian International School in a gated community within KL. In the morning before the game, the team travelled to a Christian boys' home for disadvantaged boys aged from five to seventeen. Being a Christian home in a Muslim country, they receive very little in the way of government funding and survive on donations. This was a truly moving experience for the boys who were very good ambassadors for their school and community.

The Australian International School had very good facilities and one of the boys we played against had been a Taranaki boy the previous year as a student at FDMC. The game was played in drizzle with conditions more like home. The game was a bit of a mismatch which we won 9-nil.

It was time to leave KL and travel down to the old sea port of Melaka. In Melaka the team played the second oldest high school in Malaysia - Melaka High School. This state school was established in 1826 by the early settlers of the port. Once again the game was played in stifling heat with the Melaka side the most skilful side we played. In the set pieces we were able to take advantage of our height winning the game 3-nil. Melaka, with its narrow carless streets, where tricycles are used, was a welcome alternative to the hustle and bustle of KL.

Our last game of the tour was a hastily rearranged game as our original opposition had qualified for a prestigious national tournament. Unfortunately it was a disappointing way to finish as we scored plenty of goals in a one sided affair.

The tour was a success, with the team winning all their games and playing quality football in conditions and an environment, they had never experienced before and may never again. As well as the football, players saw and tasted a different culture.









