

OWING TO THE CONTINUED GROWTH OF OUR SCHOOL'S ROLL WE EMPLOYED ELEVEN NEW TEACHERS AND FIFTEEN NEW SUPPORT STAFF OVER THE COURSE OF 2023. THIS REPORT SUMMARISES THESE STAFFING CHANGES AS WELL AS ACKNOWLEDGES THOSE STAFF MOVING ON.

Hirstly, Commander Mike Li moved to us from Shirley Boys' High School in Christchurch and took up the post of Head of Physics. From the very first lesson of the year, he has enthused his students with science experiments and tales, and the 'old school' art of hard graft. His military approach has made him a very popular teacher.

Max Carroll

1932-2023









On Wednesday, 29th November 2023, the school bid farewell to a man who had given selfless service to the school for 65 years. It was fitting that Max Carroll's funeral service was held in Ryder Hall where he had sat through the assemblies of three Headmasters, and at the school, where he influenced many students over the years.

Max Carroll started at New Plymouth Boys' High School as a teacher in 1958 after being recruited from Waitara Primary. He was born and bred in central Taranaki and was an accomplished sportsman in his own right, playing cricket and rugby at the provincial level. It was only a short time until he took control of the 1st XI Cricket as a player and coach. Under his guidance for 12 years, the team generated some outstanding results and players who would go on to represent New Zealand.

When the current 1st XV coach went on to coach at the representative level and later the All Blacks, Max stepped up to coach the team — a daunting challenge to follow in such footsteps. He introduced his brand of 15-man rugby. In those days, there were no assistants or managers; Max did it all. It was a golden period for NPBHS rugby, a record that spanned 15 years, 85 games, with 58 wins and six draws. He defended the Moascar Cup (School Ranfurly Shield) 12 times. From 1967 to 1973, the team played 38 games and only lost two. Players he coached went on to represent the All Blacks, and he coached one All-Black Captain.

One of the buildings at the school currently bears his name. He is the only teaching staff member, not a Headmaster, to have a building named after him. This was in recognition of the years he put into boarding, firstly as Head of Carrington and he then returned in 1981 to be Senior Hostel Master, following a mayday call from the Headmaster to rescue boarding from falling numbers and a possible closure. The fact that NPBHS has a healthy boarding establishment is due to Max's work in the 1980s.







At the end of Term 1, 1991, Max decided to retire from the teaching staff at New Plymouth Boys' High School. He had given 33 years of service as a teacher of Social Studies, Geography, and PE, plus Housemaster, Cadet Commander, and coach of cricket and rugby. In these roles, he connected and influenced so many.

However, in retirement, his selfless energy for the school didn't finish. He played golf and took up fly fishing but worked tirelessly for the Old Boys' Association, organizing reunions and raising funds for the NPBHS Development Fund. He also wrote five books for the school on the history of boarding, rugby, cricket, and the cadets, which will live on in the school with his

On 29th November, the hearse left his old school to a rousing school haka from boys born 20 years after he left. They didn't know the man but knew the legacy he left behind. His last journey passed the Gully Ground and the Top Field, where he had coached so many students to fulfill their potential on the rugby field and cricket wicket. Past the boarding houses and classrooms where he had been a master, it paused at the Memorial Gate, where the flag was at half-mast. The Top Field was where Lieutenant Colonel Max Carroll, as the Commanding Officer of the NPBHS Battalion, had conducted so many cadet parades.

Thank you, Max - as a coach, teacher, cadet commander, and housemaster - you have made a difference to so many.

NPBHS is a better place because of your years of service. Rest in Peace, Max.



Anzac Assembly

On Wednesday, 26th April, we held a special ANZAC Assembly on the top field. Guests cam from around the country including our Guest Speaker, Major Simon Strombom DSD retired ED RNZAC, and Old Boy of our school. Also attending were: NP and Districts RSA President Graham Chard; and Bryce Gordon who played the Last Post/Rouse, Rt. Hon Meka Whaitiri, Minister for Veterans Affairs; Chief of Air Force, Air Vice Marshall Andrew Clark; Commanding Officer of HMNZS Aotearoa Commander Dave Barr; and our distinguished veterans - Old Boy (1936-41) Roy Roper Ex NZ Navy WW2 (and All Black 515), and former Sergeant Major of the NZ Army, Warrant Officer Retired Bob Davies MBE.

2023 Memorable Moments

Bert Wipiti's Portrait Unveiling

We were truly honoured to host a special presentation unveiling a remarkable portrait during our Assembly in April. This portrait pays tribute to Old Boy (1936–1938), Bert Wipiti (Ngāti Te Whiti).

Bert Wipiti joined the Royal New Zealand Air Force and was the first Māori pilot to be sent overseas. A superb fighter pilot, he was assigned to Singapore, serving with the RAF's no 243 squadron.

The painting by artist Matt Gauldie, was commissioned by the NZ Remembrance Army and was presented to the school by managing director Major Retired Simon Strombom.

Bert Wipiti's whānau were present at the assembly, adding significant importance to the event. Students Coredae Wipiiti-Boylan, Kace Raven (both Year 9), and Tiki Ngarangi (Year 11) assisted in unveiling the painting – 'Wipiti'.



Matt Gauldie, an Afghanistan veteran and former New Zealand Army painter, shared that Bert Wipiti's story remains largely unknown to many.

It is with great sadness that we remember Bert Wipiti's ultimate sacrifice. At the age of 21, he lost his life escorting a bombing raid on a power station in France, in October 1943.

Roy Roper turns 100

In August, we gathered in Ryder Hall for an important assembly with a special guest, Mr Roy Roper, who has reached the remarkable milestone of turning 100 years old!

Mr Roper, the oldest living Old Boy of NPBHS, has been an incredible supporter of our school, attending events and ANZAC assemblies. Roy was accompanied by his sons and Old Boys - Guy and Stuart Roper on stage, and family sitting in the hall.

Taranaki Rugby presented Roy with two special jerseys - one jersey on behalf of New Zealand Rugby, to acknowledge Roy as the oldest living All Black. The second jersey, in partnership with New Plymouth Old Boys' Rugby Club to celebrate his time playing for both Taranaki and NPOB.

Mr Roper was gifted a 1st XV cap from the school and the morning was signed off with a tremendous haka from the 1st XV and boarders.

Mr Roper sadly, died peacefully in New Plymouth on Thursday 14th September, a few weeks after he celebrated his 100th birthday.





Hillary Challenge

On Sunday, 2nd October, ninety-six students, along with their managers and coaches, descended on the Hillary Outdoors Centre in Tongariro National Park for the 23rd annual Hillary Challenge event. Among this group of elite athletes were the combined NPGHS and NPGHS team consisting of James Rielly-Leadbetter, Owen Ellington, Mathias Strohmeier, Marco Kraayenhof, Petra Hofmans, Jacquelyn Kowalewski, Makayla Wells, and Lottie Moffat. Would 12 months of training and preparation pay off?

Monday and Tuesday saw the 12 teams of 8 students rotate through 12 problem-solving challenges. These challenges included process-based challenges, high ropes, technical rope work, navigation challenges, mountain bike skills, paddling skills, climbing skills, and complex communication challenges. All tested how the teams could assimilate complex information and work as a team, demonstrating robust problem-solving processes. Teams were scored on their communication skills, trust and support, the problem-solving process, and how well they completed the task.

We felt we had a solid Day 1 and 2. However, so did other teams. We were disappointed to find out that our consistency was not as good as in previous years, and although still in the top 4 after 2 days, with Motueka leading 250 points ahead of us, we had some catching up to do.



Days 3 and 4 were the Rogaine. This was a huge trek with full packs to navigate as many checkpoints as possible, with one night spent camping on the way. This year, the trek started at the Turoa skifield road car park and finished at the Tukino skifield car park. This led to a course on the southern and eastern slopes of Mt Ruapehu. Unlike 2022, the weather had cleared to a stunning fine couple of days, with high freezing levels, so heat rather than cold was the issue. This year, the Rogaine was our strength, with awesome navigation from James and Marco, coupled with a great pace, giving us the top score for the Rogaine and also propelling us into first place from our position at the end of the first 2 days. Unfortunately for Motueka, sickness within the team meant they lost a member. The penalty points meant we were able to move past them and into the lead.

Friday and the fine weather continued. Day 5 was the multisport race, with 4 stages of blood and guts racing in the quest for the fastest time. An 8 km kayak was followed by a 9 km mud run, then a 30 plus km mountain bike ride. The final leg, another grueling 6 km hilly run, saw us finish in about 4 1/2 hours. Although we were only 4th in this race, we were close to the leaders and didn't give up much of our lead in terms of points.

Prize giving was on Friday night, and as we had expected, our team result was a first place, tempered by the bad luck that had cost Motueka the victory. The team finished first, 170 points ahead of Whakatane High School, with Wakatipu in 3rd place. In 22 years, we have had 14 firsts, been runners-up on 7 occasions, and third once.

Athletics

From the 8th to the 10th of December, twelve boys participated in the New Zealand Secondary School 50th Jubilee Track and Field and 48th Road Race Championships at Nga Puna Wai Sports Hub, Christchurch. The boys took part in several different events from the track, field and road race programs in varying weather conditions, from cold and wet to dry and windy.

Brayden Neilson took part in the senior 100m sprint, in which he made it through the heats with an 11.61 before being eliminated in the quarter-finals in 11.34, placing 19th. In the 200m sprint, Brayden also made it through his heat with a time of 23.02, however, due to an injury he was unable to participate in further rounds. Another senior who ran on the track was Felix Field, who won his 800m heat comfortably at 2:03.47. Unfortunately, Felix had trouble with severe blisters in his semi-final, causing him to limp over half the race and be eliminated at this stage. He also ran in the 1500m heats, running a time of 4:13.74, due to a difficult heat placing this time wasn't quick enough to make the final. Two other boys also ran in the 1500m heats, Zavier Brown placed 6th in his heat (only one place off final qualification) in a time of 4:12.54, a personal best performance. Nick Dobbie also ran in the same heat as Zavier, winning the heat with a personal best of 4:07.17, which he then improved once again in the final, placing 11th in 4:01.81. Nick and Zavier also ran in the 3000m on the first day, with Nick placing 12th overall in 8:54.79 (PB) and Zavier placing 26th in 9:15.20.

Several juniors also had admirable performances on the track throughout the weekend. Robert Carrick ran 12.57 in the 100m prelims, and Tukaha Rauputu also ran in the 100m, running 13.43. Aidan Galley qualified for the 400m in a personal best time of 54.03, before placing 8th in the final in 54.69. Jack Mason and Miller Ferguson ran in the 1500m heats, both qualifying for the final in times of 4.19.38 and 4:18.65 respectively, both boys beating their personal bests in the process. Both boys then ran in the 1500m final, Miller placing 12th and Jack placing 14th. Despite all this success in the distance running events, arguably NPBHS's best performances of the weekend came in the junior boys 2000m race walk, with Campbell Donovan taking 1st in 10:00.06, and Nathan Baylis completing an NPBHS 1–2, placing 2nd in 10:13.89.

Similar success was also seen in the field events. Brayden Neilson placed a very impressive 3rd in the senior boys' long jump, jumping 6.59m. Along with this, Brayden also placed a strong 7th in the High Jump, with a best jump of 1.80m. In the juniors, Robert Carrick took part in the high, long and triple jumps, placing 8th, 21st and 18th in each event respectively. Tukaha Rauputu also competed in the discus throw and long jump placing 23rd in the discus with a throw of 20.73m.

On Sunday four of the boys took part in the road race in chilly and wet conditions. Jack Mason (6th), Cooper Ferguson (14th) and Miller Ferguson (7th) all put in valiant performances in the challenging conditions, managing






Canoe Polo

Canoe Polo continued in a consolidation phase for NPBHS teams in 2023. A 'new normal' post-COVID era was upon us but we had not yet reached the clear air that many were hoping would see us back to the 'old normal' with the exposure to the backlog of imported viruses disrupting team numbers during the Term Two and Three Leagues.

However, the good news was we got to attend the Secondary School Central West qualifying competition in Palmerston North on March 4, after a two year gap. The training started in late January for NPBHS Canoe Polo with the aim of raising the skill and fitness level before attending the secondary school competitions. As is too often the case in Taranaki, we struggled to get the level of opposition during practice sessions in order for the Senior team to be at the level needed to be more competitive against the Palmerston North/Central West teams.

After a diffident start to the competition on Saturday morning with one and two goal losses respectively to Otaki College and Feilding High School, the team bounced

back with a somewhat scrappy 4–3 win over Horowhenua College. A well drilled St Pats College team was too strong but a very solid win against the top PNGHS team allowed them to work on form and function for the play-offs. As it turned out, they came up against the rather loose formation of the Horowhenua team in the play-offs, the win giving them 2nd overall in the Central West division. This qualified us for direct entry to the National Secondary Schools Competition but unfortunately we were unable to attend due to the unavailability of some players.

The secondary schools regional team members were Corban Spellman, Sam Salisbury, Daniel Bentall, Troy Perry, Tyler Read and Luca Ward.

Taranaki Secondary Schools' Competition

The Term 2 schools' competition had just two Boys' High teams competing in the High School league as a number of boys moved to the Open League competition. NPGHS, Spotswood, Inglewood and SHGC all had teams vying

for the top spot in the competition. NPBHS teams were dominant with 'Titanics' sinking the opposition in the final playoff to take 1st place and royally ending Team Purple's chance to take the crown. It must be decreed that Purple were de-robed before the game even started with three of their players either unable to attend on finals night or in the infirmary.

After NPBHS teams dominated another term of the secondary school League the concept of mixing up the school teams was suggested for Term 3. With the consent of the NPBHS boys, and other schools represented in the Secondary School league, we reconfigured the teams in an attempt to even the playing field. Open League

The senior local competition moved back to the Open League style of competitions in Term 2 and 3, once again, with both adults and selected higher skilled High School students competing for the title of individual 'strongest link'.

Term 2 - Of the top four players in the Open A League, three were Boys High players and the number one player, ex-NPBHS. Gus McCullough and Corban Spellman placed 2nd equal with Daniel Bentall picking up fourth position.

Term 3 – Five of the six top places in the Open A Division went to NPBHS players. The ever consistent Daniel Bentall took out first place, with Corban Spellman chasing him all the way to the last game of the season to achieve second equal. Samuel Salisbury picked up 4th with Gus McCullough and Matias Willison rounding out the top six.

Many thanks to the parents and volunteers who have helped out with administration for competitions, training events and trips away over the year. A debt of gratitude is owed to Taranaki Canoe Polo for the use of their competition boats and equipment and to the committee whose dedication and experience has supported many training and competition events during the year that have helped the development of NPBHS players.

New Zealand Secondary Schools Cross-Country Championship

Friday, June 16th saw a selected team of 27 athletes depart to Palmerston North for the 49th New Zealand Secondary Schools Cross Country Championships. We travelled in two 18-seater minivans and an early afternoon arrival meant we could head to the cross-country venue at Massey University.

The Massey University course in Palmerston North is a challenging one. It includes approximately 550 metres of flat sports field and 1450 metres of undulating farmland per 2 km lap with an elevation gain of 25m. Slippery conditions don't help and many a runner returns minus a shoe, or two! The boys took the opportunity to walk the course, to sort out race tactics, and mentally

prepare themselves for the race on Saturday. Dinner and motivational speeches that night from our team captains and senior runners had everyone ready for the racing tomorrow

We were missing a few of our top runners and with a very competitive field it made for a tough race for our boys. Despite this, they gave it their all and Mr Drought and I couldn't have been prouder because the effort from all of the boys was plain to see.

The Seniors raced the last race of the day. It is always difficult to wait and wait until that last race. Despite this, the boys gave it everything and claimed 4th place in the 6-man competition.


The cross country group has outstanding team spirit and was led exceptionally well by both Sam Gregory and Jack McNeil with good support from all of the senior boys.

Rocket League was a pilot event at the 2022 Commonwealth Games with Wales, England, and Australia taking the podium finish.

How good is it that we are at the cutting edge regarding new and exciting sporting opportunities for our students? We are all very proud of our National eSport Champions!

The dream that 'everyone can earn a Tiger Jacket for any endeavor if you prove yourself' is one chased by many students. NZSS Esport has given

young men the chance to compete in their field for their school in a niche sporting area. NPBHS was the first school in Taranaki to give students the chance to compete in a national competition for eSport (2017), and the boys have done us proud, winning the National title this year after long, grueling weeks of play that started in May. They also won the regional TSSSA competition.

Aidan Black (cpt), Issiah Bhana, and Luke Richardson made up the talented trio who brought the trophy home. In 2022, they were ranked second nationally, and their sights were firmly set on winning the competition in 2023. The boys play Rocket League - trios - and spend many hours a week training. 
Hamilton Boys High School exchange (Match play) played at St Andrews course Hamilton.


This meant we were able to top our pool and head to the top 16 of the tournament.

Hamilton was more clinical and brought relentless intensity to the game. The team toiled hard and never gave up, with the second try being the result of a good build up and finish. The Hamilton team provided a benchmark for where the team needs to be in terms of execution on the field and the coaching group took away positives to work on for the remainder of the season.

The last traditional fixture for the season was played on the Gully against St Patrick's College, Silverstream. The McDonald Shield was played for in this game and with Boys High holding the shield, expectations were high. Silverstream however, was a team that was highly-regarded heading into the season and the team knew it was going to be a tough battle. The team got away to a good start and played some of its best rugby to date and led 10 – 5 at halftime. The game was the clichéd game of two halves and in the second half, Siverstream fought back to take a lead it never relinquished. A few moments of ill

discipline coupled with some aggressive running meant that Silverstream took back the McDonald Shield.

A tough game against Tauranga followed, where the team went behind early and were unable to get within striking distance at any time, going down heavily 50 - 17. Tauranga was a well-drilled side that fed off the errors that crept in and played to its strengths. The result asked questions of the team facing a quick turnaround leading into the game against Palmerston North BHS.

The team travelled to Palmerston North for the last traditional of the year. A strong defensive effort, showing huge improvement on the previous game, had the team leading 5 –3 at halftime. Played in perfect conditions the team was unable to hold out a strong finishing Palmerston North side going down 21 – 11. As with last year, this was a game that the team felt got away from them. The turnaround from the previous week had the coaching group feel that a complete game was not too far away. Hastings BHS was the last fixture before the holidays and on a very wet Gully field, the team was unable to exert enough pressure on the opposition to secure a win.The final scoreline was tight 7–17 with the team never giving up and fighting to the end.

The traditional fixture against Westlake BHS was held during the school holidays and again was played on a very wet field at Westlake. A highlight of the game was to introduce a number of younger players to the 1st XV environment and give them an opportunity to experience the pace and intensity of a 1st XV game. The result did not reflect the effort put into the game by the team and the new players did not seem out of place. Westlake won the fixture 37 – 5.





FDMC 3-2



Snow sports



CHESS REPORT

Chess at New Plymouth Boys' High School has seen the beginning of a new era of prosperity and success in 2023. The school's chess club and SCP exhibited record numbers of students this year, showing a new passion for the game. In addition to this, the school's 'A' Chess team has had a remarkable year achieving remarkable results in a number of competitions.

The team's season began at the Super 8 Cultural Festival, where the 'A' team won the event for the first time in the school's history, convincingly triumphing over long-time champions Hamilton Boys' High, with dominant performances on all boards. Throughout the whole competition, the team did not lose a single matchup and only saw a few individual board defeats.

The regional chess competition also proved to be a massive success. The team came away with a clear victory, again seeing only a handful of board defeats, with no losses as a team. This victory secured the 'A' team a spot in the national finals held in Auckland.

The NZSS competition was the largest event yet and provided a playing field significantly stronger than that seen at regionals and Super 8 (with several titled players in attendance). This event consisted of seven rounds, with five rounds being played on Day 1, and the remaining two rounds being played the following day. The team picked up an excellent performance early on, defeating ACG Sunderland in Round 1, but unfortunately lost the following three rounds to One Tree Hill College, Wellington College, and Upper Hutt College, before securing another win against Palmerston North Boys' to close Day 1 at 10th overall. The team brought it back on Day 2, scoring a win in Round 6 against the host school, Saint Kentigerns, and finishing the tournament on a high, with a narrow victory over ex-national champions, Maclean's College.

Overall, this left the team in fifth place; an extremely respectable result and the best placing an NPBHS chess team has had in decades.

The International Department in 2023 underwent several changes.

The Crammond Library was converted into an ESOL room with breakout spaces and purpose-built offices at the back of the classroom. This allowed us to be all located in one place, and the International Department was now in the school's centre. A further addition during the year was a set of flag poles along the Gully Road, which displayed the nationalities of those students who had selected New Plymouth Boys' High School as a place to study.

Mrs Jade Tyrrell was a new addition to the staff as International Student Manager and Homestay Coordinator; she joined Kit Hacker and Hugh Russell in the International Team.





The number of international students grew throughout 2023, although we have yet to reach the pre-COVID numbers. We had a roll of twenty-seven International students during 2023 from nine different countries.

We had several firsts this year when Nadav Golan joined us from Israel for a term in Term 1, and Nikita Riabov enrolled as a student from Russia. We saw the return of a student from Ikubukan High School in Japan. Rui Kashiwai joined us as a boarder at the start of 2023, and he made remarkable progress in developing his English.

Hong Kong and Germany continue to be the markets where most of our International students come from. The students come to New Plymouth Boys' High School for different reasons and lengths of time. The Hong Kong students aim to complete their secondary schooling in New Zealand, while the German boys are here for a New Zealand experience and stay for 6 to 12 months. In 2023, we had three students join the school to develop their

rugby skills, two from France for the first time and one from Germany. Matti Schroeder from Hanover developed his rugby in the 2nd and 3rd XV as a First 5/8. Our first French Rugby students arrived in January, and Sacha Gonnett gained a place in the First XV. Dimitri Vidal enrolled at the school at the start of Term 2 and stayed until the end of the Rugby season in August.

The Spohr family joined us from Bavaria in Germany from January to July. The family was on a year's vacation following their passion for surfing destinations worldwide. After four months in Bali, they chose Taranaki as their surfing destination. The two boys, Jordi and Malik, attended school in Years 9 and 11. The two boys and their parents got into the Taranaki surfing scene and the boys represented the school in Volleyball.

Gateway

Gateway opens a new barrier free pathway from school to the world of work. It is a great opportunity to blend school study with workplace learning and experience. Units are assessed in the workplace or by a Gateway provider, counting towards national qualifications.

Gateway helps build skills for employment; working in real workplaces on real tasks. It gives opportunities to try out potential careers and build links to industry-training organisations, modern apprenticeships, and workplaces.

After an interview with Mr Watts or Mr Lock, students are then encouraged to make the initial approach with the employer of their choice for their Gateway work placement. Most placements have unit standards to do in the workplace and other theory units to do in the classroom. These will all be marked by a registered assessor. Gateway students complete Health and Safety units and First Aid courses within Term 1.

Even with all the issues this year, with the interest rates, cost of living and the election it has still been successful. We have had 16 students leave to jobs, 15 to further training and 23 confirmed apprenticeships.

Ryan McNab was our successful recipient of the Prime Ministers Vocational Pathways \$2000 Scholarship Award.




Trades Academy
